Course Description

KOR 1002 is the beginning Korean course designed for students who have completed KOR 1001 or an equivalent. This course aims to continue to equip students with the fundamentals of speaking, listening, reading, writing and culture at the beginning level and to consolidate the student's knowledge of grammar through the practice of dialogues and various short-passage readings and composing short paragraphs. Approximately 1 unit will be covered for 2 class meetings, and there will be a vocabulary quiz and a quiz for each unit to help you maximally reinforce your learning.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the end of the semester, students are expected to have a good command of the followings in Korean.

- Verb conjugation for future tense, progressive or repeated actions.
- Noun modifier
- Negation
- Sentence ending to suggest that someone do, to make a polite request or commend, to express necessity, to express a proposition, to express the speaker's intention for future plan to do something, etc.
- Irregular verbs

- Sentence ending for the honorific form past tense
- Clause connector to express a reason or cause for an action or state

Course Requirements & Grading

(1) Attendance and Participation (10%)

- Attendance: Students who are absent because of participation in approved Institute activities (such as field trips, professional conferences, and athletic events) will be permitted to make up the work missed during their absences. - Participation: Bottom-Line Rules: During class, students will not be permitted to work on homework, study for another class, use laptop/phone for anything not class-related, etc. (See the Course Expectations & Guidelines below for more information)
- (2) Homework (30%): All instructions are available at Canvas All Quizzes
- Writing HW (15%): handwriting or typing (submit online in Canvas) + one movie review
- Speaking HW (15%): reading + free talking (submit online at Canvas)

(3) Oral Performance & Project (40%)

- Oral Quiz: Students will have one-on-one conversation with an instructor as an oral quiz and there will be three oral quizzes. Guideline will be provided in advance.
- Individual Presentation: Student will make an oral presentation about "*My Favorite Korean OOO!*" (e.g., music, drama, movie, snack, food, place, people, class, culture, etc.)
- (4) Vocab Quiz (10%): A vocabulary quiz will be given for each unit.
- (5) Midterm Test (10%): Guideline will be given in advance.

(6) Extra Credit (2%)

• Attending Korean events (0.2% per one time): Attend Korean events and turn in the ticket or photo.

- Writing a review (2%): Write a review for the Korean event that you attended. Or watch a Korean movie/TV show, or read written materials, such as Korean book, news column, or internet newspaper and write a review in 10 Korean sentences.
- Phone Texting (1% for 5 complete sentences): Text to your Korean family or friends in Korean.

(7) Grading Scale

Your final grade will be assigned as a letter grade according to the following scale: A: 90-100% B: 80-89% C: 70-79% D: 60-69% F: 0-59%
